Every road safety officer is given special equipment to help her/him with her/his responsibilities. The jacket is used to be more visible whether it is daytime or dark. The badge is also used for visibility. The whistle is used to warn pedestrians and other road users of approaching traffic. Make sure you use your road safety equipment efficiently and responsibly Identify areas from where children come to school and make sure you help them cross the dangerous roads and intersections that they come across.

Help all children learn the important rules of traffic and road safety. These rules can help save many lives.

Help your teacher in organizing mela's, walks, dramas and other activities in your school that will help all children learn about road safety.

Try identifying traffic problems in your community, especially the problems around your school and discuss these problems with your teacher and head master/mistress to resolve these problems.
